# **About The Mural Music & Arts Project**

The Mural Music & Arts Project (MMAP) educates, empowers, and inspires at-risk youth through participation in the arts. MMAP offers year-round youth development programs, serving the communities on the Peninsula and in San Francisco. MMAP began in 2001 as the East Palo Alto Mural Art Project, employing local teens to design and create a mural for every school in the local school district. Since then, MMAP's teen artists have researched, planned, and installed a public arts legacy. These murals reflect themes of community, cooperation, equity, justice, environment, and local history. Active and enthusiastic support inspired MMAP to expand and diversify its programs to include arts education, Hip-Hop, music production, and dance. To date, MMAP has served over 900 youth, created 98 murals, and produce original music that was written, recorded, and performed by MMAP youth.

MMAP's current programs include the Teen Mural Program, the Health Education Through Art Program, the History Through Hip-Hop Program, the Public Art Consulting Group, and the Graffiti Art Project. The Teen Mural Program employs local teens during the summer to research, design and install a large, public art mural in their community. The Health Education Through Art Program serves youth during the vulnerable after-school hours and utilizes both visual and performing arts, such as tile mosaics, ceramics, painting, dance, and music production to promote health education for 4th through 8th grade students. History Through Hip-Hop is an after-school program that employs students to write, record and produce original music, and thereby increases literacy and provides students with the tools to become a positive in their community. The Public Art Consulting Group employs teens after-school and during the summer to work with professional artists to fulfill public and private art commissions. The Graffiti Arts Project is in collaboration with the local law enforcement and the Department of Justice to combat youth vandalism and graffiti crimes in Silicon Valley with a curriculum that focuses on skill development, property restoration, and using artistic talent for positive expression.

MMAP's plans to increase programs to middle school students and to new communities expand collaborations with local and international arts organizations, grow current programs, and advance Web and interactive projects like the Virtual Tour Initiative.



Jeatured at the entry of MMAP's headquarters, this mural represents leadership in civic engagement and depicts how MMAP teens strive to take individual and collective actions to identify and address issues of public concern. A noble eagle envelops the room, spreading its wings upward across the walls and ceiling, representing the determination of a people to develop and sustain a just society. This enduring American icon also represents MMAP's efforts to develop young people as a powerful, positive force that extends its wings throughout the community. Interwoven with the eagle's feathers are portraits of past and present MMAP students. They demonstrate their leadership and civic engagement through painting, musical production, and performance. Within the eagle's pinions, an amalgamation of MMAP's public art legacy is depicted portraying themes of justice, peace, and collaboration.

"We Are the Change: Leading Our Generation" represents MMAP's collective and sustained endeavors to improve our community. The mural design reflects the youth who have made an impact on their community and continue to do so through the creative arts. The mural welcomes visitors to the MMAP family and to a home where artistic and life aspirations can be achieved.

# Face The Future: Making Leaders in the Classroom

his mural represents leadership in education. It depicts a future view of our local, statewide and national communities and their roles in fostering a strong education system.

On the left hand side of the wall, a young girl sits on a stack of books and ponders what she will chronicle next. The notebook becomes enlarged before her, a testament to the power of her expression. Scales represent the expected victory in the Robles-Wong v. California litigation, which seeks to bring equitable reform to the state's education funding system. The ladder behind her symbolizes a passage to investigate her history.

In the center of the mural, a young boy reaches out to touch his reflection in a mirror. In his reflection he wears a graduation cap, representing success and his growth as a leader of the future. The mural invites viewers to look into the mosaic mirror centerpiece, reinforcing the idea that we can each strive to become leaders.

On the mural's right, a MMAP youth stands on a sturdy column and kicks down pillars that represent inequities in our current education system, rendering them as rubble. California poppies emerge, symbolizing the state's education vision, and bees pollinate across the state. These mural elements demonstrate the strength of MMAP teens as students and creative learners in the community.

# Bridging the Gap: Connecting Communities

MAP's Technology Lab gives community youth access to advanced technology not often available in homes or schools. "Bridging the Gap: Connecting Communities" raises awareness of the lack of access to technology, and urges its audience to level these inequalities.

On the bottom left of the mural, a young Indian girl sits at a desk with an outdated laptop connected to the internet by "dial-up" technology. She happily chats with a peer across the globe about technological issues facing teens today. To her right, we see a mound of obsolete computer hardware. Directly across from her sits the person on the other side of the conversation. A young American boy uses up-to-date desktop and laptop computers, illustrating the contrast in technological access between the two.

At the center of the mural, a steel bridge connects the two teenagers' locations, and the gap between them. The gap separates the "developing" and the "developed" communities of the world; communities oceans away or literally just one bridge apart; and between students in the same classroom.

On the ceiling hovers a single satellite, a vital tool for the transmission of knowledge. It sends signals to the communities of both the Indian girl and the American boy, implying equality in all aspects of technology and enabling a truly global society. The satellite represents the power to join communities together, juxtaposed against the power to divide and exclude. The mural fundamentally represents youth leadership and self-empowerment achieving the vision of technological equity.

# Follow Our Lead: Blueprint for Success

This mural exemplifies the importance of leadership for economic empowerment. A Forbes magazine cover illustrates two MMAP youth, recognized as accomplished CEOs. This depiction presents the potential of each MMAP youth to achieve leadership in business and commerce.

The map outlines of East Palo Alto and surrounding communities inspire their residents to invest more in their own communities and local businesses. Following footsteps in the mural, the viewer is led to a road on the frame of a Monopoly board. The first houses on the road appear as small Monopoly pieces; however, as the viewer's eyes travel further up the road, the products of local community investment are revealed in the shape of local home businesses.

The ship at the end of the Monopoly board, named the "Leader Ship," is embarking across the ocean towards a globe. This image serves as a metaphor, signifying that with effective leadership, MMAP youth can set their examples and take a successful community business model to other communities across the globe.
